Anthony Maglio and the Big Dig

October 2015

Budding Archaeologist Anthony Maglio completed BTECs in Information Technology and Forensic Science providing him with three Distinction* and an AS level Anthropology whilst at Godalming College. He left in 2015 and before joining Bournemouth University's Archaeology and Forensic Science department as an undergraduate he took part in the Big Dig at the National Trust's Petworth House in West Sussex. The Big Dig is part of a project set up in 2012 to find Petworth Park's hidden past. Anthony says of his time at Petworth "I learnt how to write out documentation for the trenches we had dug; identifying the different colours of the soil layers, the depth of the trench, the trench's geological area, the materials found. We were also mattocking which is the method for digging the trenches. We learnt to do geophysical surveying using high end technology. It was the most amazing experience - I loved it."




Colombia Calling by Tessa Duncan
